For the first time since 1926, our Athletic Field, Hoops Courts, Bunks, Mess Hall and more were not be used to serve Camp Avoda campers.



When we made the video announcing cancellation of camp, it was strange and difficult to utter the words. We are certainly living in strange and challenging times. The decision was not an easy one. The board and camp leadership took time and did analyses. As we watched camps around us close it became harder to opt to open. So many unknowns and risks. Ultimately, we

In the midst of this we had the foresight to put together a campaign to sustain (some might even say “save”) Camp Avoda. Even in the best-case scenario we were trending toward financial hardship. And the “no camp” scenario was one of five for which we created financial models. As you can imagine, having to spread out two years of expenses with only one year’s income is a challenge for any business. Of course we save a lot from excluding summer expenses, but there are many more costs that do not stop. And we also have to refund money back to many families.

In any case, we mobilized: we set up a hierarchy of committee members, development teams, decade generals and bunk captains. The team kept growing as more and more people joined the cause. When all was said and done we had engaged more alumni than ever. I hope you were lucky enough to join your Bunk 14’s Zoom calls. We held them for most age groups’ Bunk 14’s from 1970 to 2014. These Zoom video chats were a huge success by raising awareness and alerting everyone to our situation.

Equally if not more importantly, the Zoom chats really served our community-building mission by bringing people together and engaging so many wonderful alumni, many of whom had been out of touch for decades! The stories, the memories, the regrets, the

trophy winners, the jokes, the urban legends, and more were all incredibly recollected as if they were yesterday. Avoda indeed makes a lasting impression. And by the way, we met our goal of \$360,000. This is truly amazing. We were a model for other camps. Thank you!

As someone on the frontline “selling” camp to new camper families, I often mention the incredible alumni and community we have. The boys will certainly create unique and special memories. In my introduction letter I write, “And your son will likely make friends that he feels closer to than those from other aspects of his life. When he is in his 20’s, 30’s, 40’s and further on he will probably get together with his camp friends and brothers to share laughs about their camp days, share good times and be there to support one another through tough times.

If you’d like that for your son, give us a call!” This could not be more applicable.

So thank you for stepping up in our time of need. Thank you for connecting with one another. Thank you for being an integral member of this special place, program, history, and community that is Camp Avoda.

The main difference is we’re not a separate entity anymore. As a result, we have a seat on the Camp Board, filled by Sam Mirkin, giving our association a voice to weigh-in on Camp operations. We’re excited about the joint collaborations ahead.

When I joined the Alumni Board in 2011, I was happy just to be keeping in touch with friends and giving back to Avoda. In fact, a lot of the crew when I started are still on our committee today – Dave Chella, Jeff Vetstein, Seth Fox, Sam Mirkin, Dave Glattstein, Aaron Agulnek, and Larry Rubin. From the Hall of Camp Avoda to the Shores
of...the Potomac

My fellow Avodians. I am pleased to report that the state of the Avoda Nation in the District of Columbia is strong. Regardless of what you might read in the (fake) news, DC isn't only about impeachment, political polarization and a do-nothing congress. In fact, the Nation's Capital is also all about Avoda.

Fact. DC is home to the legendary Satloff crew (Rob, and his three sons). Fact. The Satloffs, the (Ariel) Waldmans and the (David) Yarkins all live right around the corner from my team (Team Alter), and Lee Kaiser lives in close proximity/south of the Mason Dixon line. Fact. Current Avodians living in the DMV are strong in number and growing. But that was not always the case.

And it all started about ten years ago with a Shabbat dinner and a snow storm.

As I remember it, Ken (Shif) and Tom (Leavitt) were coming to town to meet with potential donors. They reached out and ultimately agreed to join my family for Friday night dinner. There are two things you should know about the DC winter. First, it never actually snows in DC. And second, we still manage to get more snow days than Boston. But this particular weekend was different. Ken and Tom brought the real stuff down from the North. A legitimate blizzard. The city shut down completely. Ken and Tom were trapped. And so there we were, sitting around the table (I think Tom wearing a beanie), talking about camp with my wife and kids, my only son Adam curious but still too young for Bunk 1. Ken and Tom shared the challenges facing camp, including recruiting. The Needham/Newton/Sharon markets, consistently a huge source of Avodians, were tapped. And camp needed more boys, more boots on the ground. Ken suggested that we consider hosting a DC open house. His plan - Light food and beverage. A living room slide show followed by Q&A. Avoda nerf footballs for the boys to chuck in our back yard. A few counselors would come in from the local colleges (GW and Maryland). And my oldest daughter was a Pembroke girl. Solid.

We invited our kids' friends -- from school, synagogue, soccer team, baseball. The first year, we had a few indications of interest but no one bit. Round 2. Ken came back a year later for another open house. And the strangest thing happened. A few DC-based kids actually signed on. And all of a sudden we had real live campers to talk about Avoda at subsequent DC open houses. Two Avodians became three, and three became six. Before we knew it, four of the starting five (on the 2019 Junior Hoops team) were DC guys. The list reads like a current who's-who of Avoda: Davidson, Frumkin, Goldberg, Hasenberg, Satloff, Schreiber, Steindecker, Veksler and Alter, just to name a few. All in, approaching 30 Avodians. Southerners during the off-season, but Middleboro-bound once school lets out. I can only imagine the horror of being on the Southwest flight that so many of them fly home after camp ends.

Last summer, Rob Satloff lost his wife Jennie (z"l) after a courageous battle with cancer. Camp was in session. David, the youngest Satloff, was already at Avoda. The DC Avoda contingent mobilized. David travelled home for the funeral (and then back to camp) with the support of Ronni and a group of his Avoda brothers. It illuminated for me what camp means but it also highlighted how far we had come from that Shabbat dinner on that snowy night.

As Ken will tell you, camping is a competitive business. Avoda needs campers if it is going to continue to thrive. There are so many choices and outside pressures pulling kids away. But we have a product at Avoda for which there is "none that can compare." It remains a timeless place where boys become brothers, form life-long friendships, and learn about who they are through gritty competition. We can all help the Administration and the Board open up a pipeline to potential recruits. In my view, that's the only way to ensure that all of our sons, and future generations of boys, will be able to write their own Avoda legends on the shores of Tispaquin, just as we all did. Let's go!
