

President's Letter

Hello again Avoda Alumni,

I'm writing this year's letter with mixed emotions. A lot has happened since the 2023 Bugle. I'll start with the good news, as we've been breaking a few records:

- In August, we held our 3rd annual Avoda Golf Tournament, which saw a record 104 golfers
- In September, Avoda's 1st annual Rodman Ride raised over \$40,000 for the Adam "Bubba" Miller Scholarship Fund. A first-time event, but also now a record (which we should break this year!)
- In November, the 24th annual Thanksgiving Football Game took place with a record 40 players
- In November / December, the 15th annual Phone-a-Thon
 was reinvented and raised over \$15,000 in one night for
 the Avoda Fund, not a record but very impressive given
 it's scaled-back effort

The bad news: in January, we were hit with a loss that we're still recovering from. Our long time Director and keeper of all things Avoda, Paul G. Davis, passed away. PGD was Camp Avoda. Anyone who knows Avoda knows that. What struck me after his passing though, was learning how he was so much more than just the fearless leader of Avoda.

PGD, with a Master of Education from Boston University, was a music teacher in the Winchester Public Schools for 35 years and directed the music of many school plays. He was honored by the Mass. Music Educators Association for his contributions. He served as treasurer and negotiator for the Winchester Education Association and was honored with a Distinguished Service Award from the Mass. Teachers Association. He also served as the choir director and organist at Temple Shalom in Medford, MA where he was treasurer in the 1980s. Staying connected with camps, he volunteered for the American Camp Association, New England, for which he was honored with the Bette Bussel Distinguished Service Award.

One thing I loved about PGD is that he didn't rock the boat. Yes he got serious sometimes on the mic at the Mess Hall podium, and yes he kept things in order over the PA system, but his approach was more like a good GM making sound business decisions in the background of a winning team. When his silver minivan, with license plate "AVODA," was parked outside his cabin, we knew Camp was in good hands.

There are so many unforgettable PGD memories and stories, many of which are captured in this unique edition of The Bugle that includes a special PGD tribute as a keepsake.

On behalf of the Alumni Committee and all alumni, our thoughts are with the Davis family. Avoda will always welcome Bobbie, Jeff, and Debbie, and we are eternally grateful for PGD's dedication to making Camp our home for over half a century.

We're heading into summer with camper numbers high, camp looking great, and a can't-miss schedule of alumni events, starting with Alumni Weekend featuring a PGD Celebration on June 15th. It's all coming up fast, see you there!

When I sit around the poker table with my camp friends, while we certainly talk about life, our kids, and each other, there is no shortage of camp talk and camp stories. This is one of the magical parts about camp now – this summer, and on into the indefinite future. A treasure chest of stories!

Growing up as campers, our age group was large, so we had three groups of bunks. We (Jeff Keselman, David Lepus Goldberg, David Schindler, Mark Pee Wee Glovin, Matt Wilkov – to name a few) would always share a cabin with the "NY Guys," Lee Kaiser, Russell Hondo Katz, Jeremy Gordon, Jim Feldman to name a few. In a different building were the "A Team" of Jay Yampolsky, Russell Sherman, Greg Smith, and Howie Finer again, just to name a few.

I sometimes think of the bunk-talks we would have within our bunk. It was restorative justice before such a thing existed. We would sit around after taps and explain to each other what we liked and didn't like about the vibe in the bunk. It was an opportunity to communicate, open up and grow. Of course, there were also regrettable things said and done, as we were kids, that I wish I could go back in time and repair. As I tell our staff, life is about making decisions.

Of course, there are chapters and volumes of sports ups, downs and controversies. Highlights like Russell Sherman stopping a forceful Greg Smith during a critical Color War moment. I also fondly remember the fun and ridiculous times when the other side of the cabin would get late night pizza (and we didn't). We would do anything for pizza – it smelled so good! Just a slice!? No? OK we will take anything. True story: the other side would throw their crust to the middle section of the cabin – on the floor, not far from the trash barrel. We would happily run over, pick up the crust and eat it. While this sounds gross and not happily spirited, it was fun then and it's fun to look back on such times as simpler, and spirit and character building.

At camp these days there are other chapters and volumes still be written. There is more staff oversight and an emphasis on positive values, accountability and upright citizenship. But there is still a lot of independence and kids and staff creating experiences and finding their way.

When you come to camp to visit this summer, ask the Staff, CIT's and campers what happened in Color War last summer. Ask them about League. Ask them about what happens at night in the bunks — a lot! Dance parties for younger campers, older campers playing cards, and mock drafts for DW and CW where kids create fantasy teams for our marquee events. Ask them about last summer's "Boy Oy Oy" chants in the Mess Hall — hilarious. Ask them about Sung Beats. Ask camper Danny Karas about our searching for his retainer in the trash in the Grove after an all-camp cookout and finding it!

Camp Avoda is still a magical and special place where we create space for boys, teens and college-aged staff to spread their wings, try new things, fail, succeed, learn, build relationships, and grow as people. They fill their toolboxes of lessons, garnered from experiences over the years. I can't think of anything more fun, worthwhile, and amazing.




