A new beginning

IT HAS BEEN A YEAR since the last issue of *The Avoda Alumnus*. Since that time, a number of changes have taken place for both the camp's Board of Directors and the Alumni Association Board. Because the fallout from these changes was still unclear last fall, there was no issue published as is usually done in October. Well, needless to say, all is now known and we're glad to report that all is well. The 1995 summer season will be an exciting new beginning for all of us.

The Board of Directors has a new president, Herb Bamel. Herb and Alumni Association prez Jason Rubin met in February to create a more open channel of communication between the Board and the Alumni Association. This new relationship will benefit both the camp and its alumni.

The Board's changes are as follows: longtime Treasurer David Barnet passed away last year, and Middleboro Selectman Alton Kramer, a member of the Board for many years, decided to resign from active participation, though he continues to serve as the camp's liaison with the town – a very valuable role indeed. To restock the Board, and to ensure that future ventures are managed by people with the appropriate skills, the Board has added a few new members – all Avoda alumni. They are Carl Goldberg, Joel Horvitz, and Jim Singer.

Since Carl and Joel were members of the Alumni Association Board (plus the fact that another member, Jay Epstein, also has resigned), a significant reorganization seemed necessary. Says Jason, "I have borrowed the Board's committee model to ensure active participation of all members, something in which I believe very strongly and have stressed during my term as president. By the time of this summer's Alumni Weekend, we hope to add two or three more members, preferably from the ranks of those whose Avoda experience is five years removed or less."

For the Alumni Association Board, this reorganization still is a work in progress, and we hope to move forward with a range of activities in the fall, including efforts to recruit new campers to Avoda and to create a number of new and fun alumni events.

"There is a lot of work being done and more that still needs doing," says Jason. "I am committed to making the Alumni Association a visible and positive contributor to Avoda, and a valuable resource and service provider to alumni. The 5th annual Alumni Weekend (see story on page 3) will be the best ever; we hope you can make it, especially if you've never come before. And remember, the best thing about a new beginning is that the best is yet to come."

It was 20 Years Ago Today...

I THOUGHT IT WOULD BE FUN to go tripping through the Avoda Archives (read: my closet) in search of clues into the daily realities of Avoda life in the dark and distant past. Well, maybe 20 years isn't all that long ago, but it sure is a nice, even number. Ed.

Tradition

The following items all were found in the 1975 Avodian. First up, this touching and poignant excerpt from a touching and poignant article by Tom Leavitt, then the CIT Director:

"There were tears in his eyes and silence in his voice. All were still and then my eyes began to fill up. He left the podium and returned to his seat at the head table. Still the silence was deafening, and then all at once, thunderous applause broke out that 1973 Banquet Night. It was Peter Varga's last year at Avoda. Somehow after 13 years, he was an institution here. Although his generation, and those he grew up with at camp, were no longer here, he was a symbol of a past Avoda.

"It was then that Pioneering and Campcraft programs were big here. People wanted to build, to create with their hands. For them, that was the only thing needed for a 'good summer.' The Chapel Site was built by campers, the camp sites were cleared by campers, and towers and shelters used to be built on our wooded land by campers.

"As a camper and as a staff member, it seems as though you go through different eras. For example, how many Avodians now know who Tisch and Miller were, or Big Julie and Bobo? Whatever happened to the Bobo Sky Rocket Cheer?

"There are two qualities that make Avoda different from all the rest: tradition and friendship. Without the former, I doubt there would be the latter. This is why year after year I return."

A Chest of Fish

The Dramatics program in 1975 went far beyond what most people would think of when considering

the repertoire of summer camp plays. As these excerpts from Dramatics Head Paul Fishman's report demonstrates, the inspired lunacy that he and Mark Chester inflicted upon the camp that year truly was something completely different:

"With the last resounding echo of the standing ovation ringing in our ears, the hurrahs and applause of yet another phenomenal dramatic season prompt us to nod our heads humbly and murmur, 'Yes fellas, we deserve it all!'

"The year started out quietly enough with Jonah and the Whale, a naughty nautical tale chockfull of blubbering puns, lewd allusions, brute sin, and verdant brouhaha, amidst the mad comedy of Paul Fishman and Mark Chester, whose comic gifts and skills constantly amaze me. Robert Satloff and Alan Burke deserve special thanks and kudos for their intense portrayal of an alcoholic corned beef on rye in Tennessee Williams' She Was Only a Golfer's Daughter But She Knew Every Stroke.

Finally, this interminable article wouldn't be complete without a warm hug and upper-cut to Mark Chester, my dear comrade and assistant director. Those endless nights we slaved over Dairy Queen sundaes, those fierce hours of endless labor over the Penthouse centerfolds, your unceasing days of sacrifice toiling thanklessly over tuna sandwiches, those heroic moments of courageous and unstinting peril as you risked life, limb, and salary to con a coke from Mr. Davis...rest assured Mark, you can rest assured."





Avoda bursting at the seams

THESE ARE GOOD TIMES INDEED for Camp Avoda. Enrollment has been solid for the last few years and shows no sign of abating anytime soon. As of mid-January, the camp had exactly two camper openings for the first month, and only 25 open for the second. By opening day, every bed, dresser, and locker will be occupied.

The Senior division, in fact, is so full that the Bunk 14 cabin is being expanded to accommodate additional campers, and director Paul Davis has recommended that the same be done with Bunks 11 and 12. Septic tanks have to be removed in order to make such construction possible.

Mitchell Stern returns as #2 man, but longtime administrator Bruce Silverlieb has called it quits after 15 summers. Taking his place will be Lee Kaiser, a 12-year veteran of Avoda. His last year was 1991. For the past two years, he has been teaching 6th grade in the Fairfax County school system in Virginia. After discussing the offer with his wife, who works full time there, he decided Avoda was important enough a reason to make him return for the summer. Lee will oversee the CIT program, among many other responsibilities.

Besides the senior bunks, other new construction planned on campus includes making an additional shower house out of the men's side of the Men's and Ladies' Rooms (the ladies side will remain a rest room for female visitors). Also, Paul has proposed to the Board building a real street hockey court, to be located in what is currently the parking lot across from the infirmary (many years before, it was the archery range and eons before that, who knows?) (If you do know, please write in and share the info. You may want to include any special memory you have of something that took place there.)

Each year, capital improvements have kept Avoda in great condition. It really is even more beautiful than you remember. Come to the Alumni Weekend this year and see for yourself!
