# Tispaquin is Looney- A Brief History

WE spent many Summers living on this Tispaquin, using it for swimming, smallcrafts, water polo, etc. with little knowledge of it's surprising history. Perhaps this is why the lore of the Lake- from Tispaquin Looney to Wheelchair Mary- can be so bone-chilling. This body of water was at the epicenter of the King Philip's War, has played a small part of our military history, and has been used for recreation for centuries. Tispaquin was named after a "fearless" Wampanoag Warrior during the King Philip's War, who is said to have been born near Middleboro in the mid-1600s.

He rose to be Sachem (Chief) of the Wampanoag's, but was executed by English Settlers in Plymouth. With the "Indian threat" reduced, European settlers deeded the area around Tispaquin soon afterwards. Henry David Thoreau, famous for his writings of another New England pond, Walden, makes note in his journal of October 5, 1855 that he stopped by the East Shore of Lake Tispaquin on his way to Plymouth. Tispaquin became a training ground for militia during the summer of 1913, when 3,000 National Guardsmen conducted drills in and around Tispaquin, camping near the Pond and conducting "mimic battles.". In the winters, through the 1920s, the lake was used for providing ice throughout the Middleboro area. Today, Tispaquin serves the recreation needs of Avoda's boys, and townies.




## DEDICATION OF BUBBA'S BACKSTOP



# A Nurse for the Ages: Mary Ann French

Mary Ann French was hired as the Camp Avoda nurse in 1993. For the next twenty-three summers (eighteen of those years as the head full-time nurse) she treated Avoda's boys and young men, from minor bruises to major fractures, and everything (staph infections) in between. But Mary Ann was much more than a camp nurse; she was also the warm-hearted and caring woman who did so much more than dispensing medicine. Young boys who were homesick found a motherly and grandmotherly figure in Mary Ann. Avoda's parents were relieved that this truly devoted and kind woman was there to oversee the health and well-being of their boys. They knew they could depend on Mary Ann, and would get timely updates on their son's health.

Mary Ann's infirmary was a respite from the day-to-day run of camp. She had a television (though you couldn't stay too long), fla-vor-ice, phone calls, and air-conditioning. She was devoted and dedicated to the care and well-being of every single camper and counselor. As a nurse, she was second to none in delivering quality care. And she did so with an infectious smile and tremendous sense-of-humor.

Mary Ann meant so much to so many people, and Avoda was just one small part of her incredible life. She was the wife of Dana and mother of Luke and Maggie (who was also beloved by many at Avoda). Mary Ann loved basketball, especially the NCAA. She was the head nurse at St. Anselm's College for many years. There, she was cherished by her coworkers and the students, many of whom worked with her at Avoda during the summer.

For twenty-six years before Avoda, she served at the head nurse at Camp Fatima. Everyone knew that Mary Ann departed a week or two early every summer, as she volunteered at the "Exceptional Citizens Week," at Camp Fatima, an overnight camp for adults



with disabilities. She gave herself for such a worthy endeavor, for more than fifty years.

Mary Ann disliked saying "goodbye" at the end of every

summer. Often she would just leave, sparing herself the emotions of departing from individuals whom she loved so dearly. And so, as she would have wanted, we simply say to Mary Ann French, "til we meet again."


