As many managers and leaders know, there is a well-known ad from Ernest Shackleton to recruit men for his hazardous journey as he explored Antarctica in the early 1900's. (There is some question about its authenticity – did he really run this ad? Regardless, I like the anecdote.)

The ad read: "Men wanted for hazardous journey. Low wages, bitter cold, long hours of complete darkness. Safe return doubtful. Honor and recognition in event of success."

Like many managers I started using this, thinking I was being smart, honest and edgy. I used it for a few interviews for nurses one year to illustrate that the summer was a journey, the workload was heavy and that they were doing hard work for the kids' advancement.

After I realized that I was scaring them off and we had no nurses, I stopped using that excerpt as a way to discuss camp.

But now as I think about this summer, I can't help but think about this ad. I think I might share it with the staff during pre-camp orientation; they will already be hired after all.

With all the planning around COVID: different forms for parents, different sessions, modified drop off procedures, locks for the water fountains, Mess Hall procedures, programming changes, and more – it feels like a "hazardous journey" already.

But we are confident that we will succeed. We have been busy working with the American Camp Association, the Mass Camp Association, JCamp 180, our pediatrician and alum Dr. Aaron Bornstein, other camps and colleagues, and our own board of directors. Ronni Saltzman Guttin, our director, has been in the trenches with the COVID rules, guidelines, and details. With Leon's help too, we feel that we have a great plan in place.



1981 was such a great year! College graduation, Larry Bird's first title, Bunk 14 counselor, Athletic Director and the end of an era. I always considered myself extremely lucky to have such a special camp experience during the 60's, 70's & now the 80's. My best & most loyal friends are and will always be my fellow Avodians! 1981 would be the last for me and fellow cohort (and soon to be roommate) Louie Dennis. Louie & I met in 1974 when I returned to camp after a 4-year hiatus in Bunk 14. For many years I had the pleasure & honor in leading the camp in pep rallies for all intercamp meets. I had inherited this position from Tom Leavitt who provided me guidance and skill level needed to handle such a chore. The one thing I brought to the table I was a lot louder than Tom! I have to admit it was awesome to stand in the middle of the Mess Hall and let loose! The last meet of '81 was against archrival Camp Bourndale. Back in those days they were stuck up, wealthy, and spoiled! It would also be the last meet for the counselor team. The staff had a record number of seven games that year (being AD had its advantages!). I was so proud to say that team was the best I had played for & with. Robbie Coppel (guest WFD that year), Steve Aronson, Steve Camiel, Mike R-O-T-H, David Benga Bejamin, Mike R-O-S-S, Louie D in center always! David Wald (sorry Nat Phillips, too young!), and yours truly (coached, pitched & batted clean up! Another AD advantage!).

As lunch was finishing up the excitement was starting to build! I could sense this was to be my final "YOU AIN'T GOT NO PLACE ON YOUR RIGHT.....YOU AINT' GOT NO PLACE ON YOUR LEFT! I got into the middle of the mess hall and screamed "THIS IS IT-THE LAST TIME"! The place was going bonkers! I'll always remember even the kitchen crew with Jason "Boob" Rubin, Larry "Sticks" Crasnick & Scott "Zamboni" Brown were front and center, hitting trash can lids together like cymbals! LOUD LOUD LOUD like a playoff game in Boston Garden against the 76'ers! The building was shaking to the point that this moment, years later was voted #1 in Avoda history! I believe that we won all events that day (it really doesn't matter!) The staff won its final game and finished 7-0 in both basketball & softball encounters. Also, we had planned to start Color War with me taking on Mickey Russo in a fight at the end of the game (my fellow AD director at Bourndale and pal from New Bedford). Such a great way to end a special day. I slept very well that night! 1981 was filled with so many amazing moments that will live for lifetime. I know I've thanked all my great friends over the years for all those memories. Well I'm thanking you all again. And as Jay Epstein always says (co-founder with me of the Pink Flamingos) There is nothing like AVODA!
