It was June 1978 and Ma and Pa Keselman were hurriedly packing up an old steamer trunk with shorts, t-shirts, socks, an old wood tennis racket, army rations, and about 100 other "essential" items from a list provided by PGD. They were, of course, readying me for my first Avoda experience and while none of us knew it at the time, I would spend the next 14 summers of my life making that drive down Tispaquin Road each June. My final summer at Avoda was 1991 and looking back, so many of the memories I have of my time at camp seem as though they happened yesterday. Over the years, my "camp" friends have become simply my friends with Avoda acting as a mystical getaway for a night or two each summer.

I met a wonderful woman last June at a Red Sox game and we recently became engaged. Do you know what we talked about on our first date? Camp. She is a Yavneh woman and so she understands the connection camp provides. Sarah was and continues to be overwhelmed, though, by the Avoda bonds, as it seems everywhere we go, we run into an Avodian or two. From running into Sam Mirkin and David Goldberg at a viewing of "Three Kings," Andy Spear outside Fenway Park, David Gagel at Diamond Deli, or a Saturday basketball game in Newton Centre that often features Avodians spanning 20 years in age, Sarah has been exposed to Avoda from day one.

A year and a half ago, I was approached by the Alumni Association and asked to become a board member. I was flattered and jumped at the chance. From its beginning, the Alumni Association has made raising money for scholarship a huge part of its mission. We do so in the hopes of providing assistance to families whose financial position does not afford them the same opportunity to experience Avoda as we had in the past.

Stan Miller would have become a great man at any camp, in any society. We were so very fortunate to have him in our special place amongst the whispering pines. Honor him by maintaining his graceful spirit, carrying on the tradition that he embodied, supporting a place he deemed worthy of special attention.

DEDICATION



We, the campers and staff of Camp Avoda, dedicate the 1989 Avodian Yearbook to a true Avodian in every sense of the word. That person is none other than Stanley Miller, the President of the Camp Avoda Board of Directors.

We honor Mr. Miller for his fifty years of continuous involvement and service to Camp Avoda. Mr. Miller started his camping career at Avoda in 1939 as a seven-year old camper in Bunk 1. He worked his way up to become one of the elite "Betty Grable Commandos" in Bunk 14, and in 1953 was appointed to the position of Camp Director - the youngest person ever to hold that position. His involvement continued through the 1950's and 1960's, and in the 1960's he

was named to the Board of Directors of Camp Avoda. In the early 1970's Mr. Miller was elected to the presidency of the camp, a position he continues to hold today.

Mr. Miller's concern and interest in every aspect of camp life is evidenced in everything he says and does. In 1951 he and Mr. Martin Wolf, who is currently the secretary of the Board of Directors (he, too, started as a camper in 1939 as a very young boy), donated a trophy to the camp in honor of its twenty-fifth silver anniversary. This trophy, which has been presented annually since 1951, has inscribed on it the names of those campers who most closely exemplify traditional Avoda leadership.

We look forward to Mr. Miller's continued service and dedication to the boys of Camp Avoda for many years to come.



Those Enduring First Impressions

Believe it or not, one of my first images of Camp Avoda was one of pure evil and stark terror.

A little background. My first summer was 1973. It was on a rainy June day that I first stepped foot on Avoda soil. It was a birth of sorts, and if you count back nine months to the previous September, you come to the source of the evil and terror.

September 1972. Munich, Germany. The summer Olympics. Eleven Israeli athletes and officials taken hostage and murdered in a gunfight between Palestinian terrorists and German police. It was unthinkable. Tragic. Chillingly familiar. Not them. Not now. Not again.

Fast-forward nine months. As I settled into my bunk (3) and met my counselors and bunkmates, I was just another 10-year-old Jewish boy beginning his Avoda odyssey. Sometime after the parents left, waiter's call was played. And then the concept of waiter's call was explained to us. And then I was told I was a waiter today. And then I was told how to get to the mess hall and what to do. And so I went.

As I stepped into the mess hall, I was stunned to see a large board with 11 black-and-white photos of the murdered Israelis. I remembered them from the newspapers and the news broadcasts. I thought I wouldn't see them again. I was wrong. They were there, watching me carry plates and silverware to my table.

Jay Epstein, who ran the Education program that summer, had decided to use the Olympic tragedy as a platform for exploring what it means to be Jewish in a non-Jewish world. Believing that kids could relate to the fact that most of the victims were athletes, he and Photography Head Paul "Moose" Hantman had their photos blown up and mounted. They remained displayed that entire summer, and are indelibly inked into my brain to this day.

The 1972 Olympics spawned a number of familiar faces, such as American swimmer Mark Spitz and Russian gymnast Olga Korbut. But though we forget their names, the faces of those 11 Israelis are perhaps the most enduring.

What exactly happened? As recounted in the December 11, 1999 issue of London's *The Times* in its series of 20th century milestones, "Before dawn on the eleventh day of the Munich Olympics, a small gang of guerillas from the Palestinian Black September organization climbed the fence into the Olympic

Village. They helped, and were helped by, a small group of American athletes who had sneaked out for a night on the town. The terrorists entered the Israeli quarters, killed two men and took nine hostages. After a day of negotiation, they went to the airport. In the gunfight that ensued, five of the terrorists, a German policeman and all nine hostages were killed."

Following the attack, that afternoon's events were suspended. The Egyptian team announced it was withdrawing from the Games. Mark Spitz, a Jew, packed up his seven gold medals and went home. Newspapers all over the world printed the photos of the murdered Israelis. And nine months later, there they were, serving as an important reminder to the Avoda community that while being Jewish is often taken for granted at camp, it is a highly charged and resonant reality in the broader society.

The tragedy was the subject of the recent Oscar-winning film, One Day in September. In addition, a memorial to the 11 Israelis has been installed at the site of the upcoming 2000 Games in Sydney. For me, it will always have a permanent and prominent place in my Avoda memory.


